

1989 EAGLES GAME-BY-GAME REVIEW

(Figures are actual attendance)



The Eagles took advantage of several big plays and a consistent pass rush to defeat the Seattle Seahawks, 31-7, in the season opener at Veterans Stadium. Andre Waters blocked a punt by Ruben Rodriguez on Seattle's first possession to set up the Eagles at the Seahawk's 1-yard line and set the tone for the entire game. From there, Anthony Toney's TD run gave the Eagles a 7-0 lead. Despite allowing Seattle a 1st quarter TD, Philadelphia went on to limit the touted Seahawk ground game to just 77 yards and force Seattle to take to the air. The Birds' pass rush, however, recorded four QB sacks (2 by RDE Clyde Simmons) and helped force 3 interceptions. A Luis Zendejas 23-yard FG in the 2nd quarter gave the Birds a lead they would never relinquish. Philadelphia opened the second half with an 80-yard TD drive and a 24-7 advantage. The Birds' defense then combined with the rushing attack to take control of the game. In the 4th quarter, CB Eric Everett picked off a pass by Kelly Stouffer and returned it 30 yards for a TD to provide the final margin of victory. WR Mike Quick had the 21st 100-yard receiving game of his career.

In one of the most exciting games in NFL history, the Eagles used 5 TD passes and a team-record 447-passing yards by Randall Cunningham to rally from a 20-0 deficit and defeat the Redskins, 42-37, at Washington. The 'Skins set the tone early by scoring on their first two offensive plays while the Birds committed turnovers on their first three possessions. By halftime the Birds had fought back to trail 30-14 and, after intermission, scored touchdowns on their second and third possessions but missed a chance to take a lead when Luis Zendejas missed a 33-yard FG attempt. The 'Skins then increased their lead to 37-28 with 3:06 remaining. But the Eagles pulled within 2 points with a 69-yard drive capped by Cunningham's fourth TD pass, this one a "jump ball" toss Mike Quick hauled in among a crowd. Washington's Gerald Riggs seemed to shut the door on the Eagles, however, when he capped his 221-yard rushing day with a 58-yard gallop. But three plays later, Riggs fumbled; the Eagles' Al Harris picked up the loose ball and lateraled to Wes Hopkins who ran 77 yards to the Redskins' 4. On the next play, Cunningham drilled the game-winning TD pass to Keith Jackson to give coach Buddy Ryan his first victory at RFK Stadium.

After rallying a week earlier for a victory at Washington, the Eagles got a dose of their own medicine from the defending and eventual Super Bowl Champion 49ers. San Francisco's Joe Montana threw for 428 yards (highest total ever against the Birds) including four 4th quarter TD passes to rally the visitors from 11 points down with 6:36 remaining and defeat the Birds 38-28. The 49ers took an early 7-0 lead on a 68-yard TD pass from Montana to Jerry Rice, but Philadelphia, behind the play of its defense (6 first half sacks) began to control the game and led 12-10 at the half and 18-10 after three quarters. The 49ers gained momentum early in the 4th quarter, however, when Montana hit John Taylor on a short out pattern that turned into a 70-yard TD. The Eagles then retaliated with a TD drive of their own for a 28-17 advantage, but SF took the lead when Montana found Tom Rathman, Brent Jones, and Rice for TDs. Philadelphia's offense had an opportunity to shut the door on the 49ers in the second half but mustered only 3 FGs after reaching SF's 13, 26, and 1-yard line.

In a Monday Night rematch of the 1988 "Fog Bowl" playoff game, the Eagles committed 6 turnovers and could score only one touchdown en route to a 27-13 defeat at the hands of the Bears. Chicago took a 13-0 halftime lead on two Mike Tomczak TD passes as the Eagles were held scoreless in the first half for the first time in 40 games. After a FG by the Eagles' Luis Zendejas cut the margin to 10 early in the second half, Neal Anderson's 2-yard TD run extended Chicago's lead to 20-3. A 24-yd. TD pass from Randall Cunningham to Gregg Garrity put the Birds back in contention and two plays later, Philadelphia had an opportunity to truly climb back into the game after recovering a Bears' fumble. The Eagles moved to a 1st-n-goal at Chicago's 2-yard line, but had to settle for a FG that made the score 20-13. Tomczak responded by marching the Bears to a TD on their ensuing drive to put the game out of reach. Cunningham threw for 401 yards on a club-record 62 attempts, but only one pass was for a TD while 4 were intercepted.

The Eagles rebounded from consecutive losses and defeated the Giants 21-19 in a tough, defensive-oriented game. Philadelphia began sluggishly, and fell behind 10-0 early in the 2nd quarter after Raul Allegre hit the first of his four field goals and reserve QB Jeff Hostetler threw a TD pass to LB Carl Banks on a fake FG attempt. The Birds got on the board when QB Randall Cunningham leaped over two Giants' defenders on a 5-yard TD run late in the 2nd quarter. The Giants built their lead to 16-7 in the 4th quarter before Cunningham scored his second TD of the game, sweeping left on a 1-yard run. That TD was set up by a 45-yard kick return by Heath Sherman and a 44-yard fake reverse by Anthony Toney. But the Giants immediately upped their lead to 19-14 with a FG. Then, Cunningham (who had thrown for only 47 yards in the first three quarters) led Philadelphia on an 81-yard drive for the winning 2-yard TD run by Toney with 2:18 to play. The Birds' defense then shut the door on New York when William Frizzell intercepted a Phil Simms' pass on 1st down.

After being held scoreless in the first half for the second time in three weeks, the Eagles rallied to score touchdowns on their first two possessions of the second half en route to a 17-5 victory. Philadelphia's defense, which stretched its streak of quarters without allowing a TD to 8, intercepted Cards' QB Tom Tupa 6 times (each by a different player) and sacked him on 6 other occasions. The Birds were led by DT Jerome Brown, who recorded 10 tackles, 2.5 sacks, forced two fumbles, and recovered another en route to NFC defensive player of the week honors. The Cards took a 5-0 lead in the 2nd quarter when DE Carl Wilson tackled FB Anthony Toney for a safety and Al Del Greco booted a 41-yard FG. But Eagles' RB Keith Byars and TE Keith Jackson, each of whom had been nursing injuries, returned to the lineup to start the 2nd half and sparked the Birds as QB Randall Cunningham directed consecutive TD drives. The Cards reached Philadelphia territory five times in the 2nd half, but came away empty as the Eagles registered four of their six INTs in that span.

The Eagles used interceptions by Izel Jenkins and Byron Evans on back-to-back drives to set up 10 third quarter points en route to their third straight victory. In a hard-fought, defensive-oriented game, where the Eagles' offense gained a season-low 195-total yards, the Birds' defense limited the Raiders to 268 yards, and more importantly, just 7 points. In the first half, each team had one sustained drive but failed to capitalize, missing FG tries. In the second half, the Eagles' pass rush (3 sacks) continually hurried QB Jay Schroeder. One rush by DE Reggie White resulted in Jenkins' INT which was returned to the Raiders' 24. After Randall Cunningham's QB sneak made the score 7-0, Steve Beuerlein relieved Schroeder and threw an INT (Evans) which led to 3 more Philadelphia points. The Raiders cut the margin to 10-7 early in the 4th quarter as Beuerlein led an 80-yard drive capped by a 24-yard TD strike to Willie Gault. After the Eagles were unable to move the ball, the Raiders took possession for 7:37 and reached Philadelphia's 15-yard line. But when a key 3rd down sack by Seth Joyner resulted in a loss of 8 yards, Jeff Jaeger narrowly missed a 42-yard FG which could have tied the game.

The Eagles were able to hold off a late Denver rally and defeated the eventual AFC Champions, 28-24 (the Broncos only home loss in '89). The Birds rushed for a season-high 215 yards, including all 96 yards of their opening TD march: On that possession, Keith Byars ran for a 16-yard TD and gained 46 of his game-high 93 yards. An interception by Izel Jenkins on the Broncos' first series led to another Eagles' TD, but Philadelphia squandered opportunities after taking possession inside Denver territory on consecutive 2nd quarter drives. Inspired, Denver cut the margin to 14-7 when John Elway scrambled for a 10-yard TD. After intermission, Philadelphia struck quickly on their longest play from scrimmage all year as backup TE Jimmie Giles (in for the injured Keith Jackson) turned a short pass from Randall Cunningham into a 66-yard TD. The Broncos surged to a 24-21 lead, however, with less than 10 minutes to play on two Elway TD passes and a FG. After failing to move the ball, Philadelphia punted but immediately regained possession at Denver's 24 when William Frizzell recovered a loose ball that had touched a Denver player. Six plays later, Byars ran for his 2nd TD and Philadelphia led 28-24. Denver had two more possessions but turned the ball over each time.

In a textbook example of a game that slipped away, the Eagles squandered numerous chances and lost at San Diego, 20-17. After SD marched 73 yards with the opening kickoff to take a 7-0 lead, Philadelphia moved inside Charger territory on four of their first five possessions, but came away empty each time. On one occasion, the Eagles reached the SD 8 but had a Keith Byars TD nullified by a holding call and Randall Cunningham subsequently fumbled. The Birds' next possession ended at the SD 37 with another INT. Philadelphia got on the board late in the half when Cunningham threw a 4-yd. TD pass to Gregg Garrity who suffered a fractured clavicle on the play. Rookie RB Robert Drummond (filling in for an injured Anthony Toney) made his first pro start a productive one as he led the team in both rushing (14-77) and receiving yardage (5-74). In the 4th quarter, Philadelphia got a 43-yard FG and, following an INT by Eric Allen on the ensuing Charger drive, a 3-yd. TD run by Byars to tie the game with 10 minutes remaining. With 1:48 to play, SD took over at its own 9 and, three plays later, Jim McMahon's 49-yard bomb to Anthony Miller put them at the Birds' 27. Chris Bahr missed a 44-yard FG to apparently force OT, but the play was ruled dead, the result of a false start by a Charger lineman. Bahr then made a 49-yarder to end the Eagles' four-game winning streak.

In a listless offensive performance, the Eagles passed midfield only three times and moved inside Washington's 20-yard line just once, en route to a 10-3 loss. The Birds were held without a touchdown for the only time in 1989. After four straight solid performances, the Eagles' running game mustered only 47 yards while the offense and Randall Cunningham's passing numbers were hampered by 11 dropped passes (after dropping just 16 in the first nine games). The 'Skins opened the scoring with a 34-yard FG by Chip Lohmiller following a fumble by Cunningham on the Birds' opening possession. Washington then took a 10-0 lead early in the 2nd quarter on a 1-yard TD run by Ernest Byner. The big play of the drive was a 24-yard pass from QB Doug Williams to TE Jimmie Johnson on a 4th-n-1 from the Birds' 33. Philadelphia narrowed the Redskin lead to 10-3 on a 49-yard FG by Steve DeLine as time expired in the first half. The second half then became a defensive struggle; Washington continued to keep the Eagles' offense from making big plays and Philadelphia permitted the 'Skins to cross midfield on just 2 of 7 possessions.

The Eagles used a ball-control offense and a solid defense that shut down RB Herschel Walker (13-48 rushing) and earned a 10-9 come-from-behind victory. A healthy Keith Jackson, playing his first full game at tight end since week two, was a key factor in the Birds' crisp, short passing game. The Eagles controlled the ball for 36:13 and entered Viking territory on 7 of 11 possessions, but continued to have problems getting into the end zone and was just 1-4 on FGs. The game began disastrously for the Birds, as Walker became the first Eagles' opponent to return a kickoff for a TD since 1974. Walker sprinted 93 yards with the opening kickoff to put Minnesota up 6-0 (the Vikes missed the PAT). The Birds' Steve DeLine cut it to 6-3 with a 34-yard FG, but Minnesota went up 9-3 in the 3rd quarter on Rich Karlis' 49-yard FG. In the 4th qtr., RDE Clyde Simmons forced Walker to fumble and Byron Evans recovered. Randall Cunningham then completed 4 of 6 passes, and with 2:32 remaining, tossed a pass to WR Cris Carter who outpumped Carl Lee for a tumbling, one-handed TD grab and a 9-9 tie. DeLine then converted the PAT for a 10-9 victory.

In front of a national television audience on Thanksgiving Day, the Eagles put together their best defensive effort of 1989 and earned their first-ever shutout against Dallas with a 27-0 victory at Texas Stadium. The defense, which set season-bests by holding the Cowboys to 191 yards of total offense and 68 net passing yards, increased its league lead in takeaways after recovering two fumbles and intercepting QB Troy Aikman three times. The offensive line provided excellent protection (0 sacks—the only time in '89), and QB Randall Cunningham was 33-21-234-2TDs passing in only 3 quarters of action. Philadelphia got most of its scoring from Cris Carter (2 TD receipts.) and former Cowboy kicker Roger Ruzek chipped in 2 FGs against his former mates (Ruzek joined the Birds one day before the game). The game will be remembered by many, however, for the opening kickoff of the 2nd half when Dallas' K Luis Zendejas (a former Eagle) collided with Eagle Jessie Small. Dallas alleged that the Eagles placed a bounty on certain Cowboys but the NFL cleared the Eagles of any wrongdoing.

The Eagles captured first place in the NFC East with a 24-17 victory over the host Giants, the Birds' fourth straight victory over the New Yorkers. Philadelphia's defense led the way by scoring two 1st qtr. touchdowns and later held off a 3rd qtr. rally by NY. The game was played in a 25 MPH wind that made the on the field temperature +2 degrees. On the game's third play, DE Reggie White sacked Giants' QB Phil Simms forcing a fumble that William Frizzell recovered and lateraled to Andre Waters who then scored a touchdown. Two series later, DE Clyde Simmons intercepted Simms and raced 60 yards for a TD (Simmons' 2nd TD at the Meadowlands in as many seasons). Overall, Philadelphia produced five takeaways and capitalized on four of them for all of their 24 points. In the 3rd qtr., NY scored 10 points to tie the game at 17. The Eagles had several opportunities to take control of the game in that same quarter, but an offside penalty negated a 86-yard INT return by CB Eric Allen. Facing a 4th down from their own 3 in the 4th qtr., Eagles' QB Randall Cunningham boomed a 91-yard punt, the longest ever by an Eagle and 3rd longest in NFL history. On the next play, Mike Golic sacked Simms and forced a fumble which the Eagles turned into the game-winning TD three plays later.

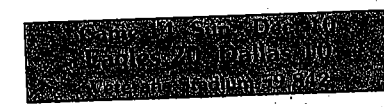

The 20-10 victory was the Birds' second in three weeks over Dallas and their sixth straight non-strike victory overall vs. the Cowboys. Philadelphia scored first as QB Randall Cunningham hit Cris Carter with a 4-yard TD pass on Carter's trademark fade pattern. Following a short Cowboy possession, the Eagles marched to Dallas' 13 where, on a fake FG, holder and backup QB Matt Cavanaugh lofted a TD pass to Carter. The Eagles' defense allowed Dallas just 194 yards of total offense, 80 of which came on a 3rd qtr. TD drive. Special teams play took center stage briefly when the Eagles' Robert Drummond partially blocked a Mike Saxon punt and, in turn, Dallas' Everson Walls blocked the subsequent FG try by Roger Ruzek. Only an excellent play by LB Jessie Small, who ran down WR Bernard Ford from behind, prevented a return of the blocked kick for a TD. While the Eagles added just one takeaway to their league-leading total, the Birds did manage to sack Aikman 5 times and hurried him on several occasions.

The Eagles fell out of first place in the NFC East with a 30-20 loss at New Orleans in a Monday Night matchup. Indeed, the Saints beat the Eagles at their own game — making and capitalizing on takeaways. Philadelphia's offense coughed up 2 fumbles and 2 INTs which resulted in 14 Saints' points, while the defense could muster just one INT. After the Saints turned two Birds' gifts into TDs early in the 2nd qtr., Philadelphia responded with an 80-yard TD drive bolstered by a 60-yard catch-n-run from QB Randall Cunningham to RB Keith Byars. The defense then shut down the Saints on three plays and, after a 28-yard punt return by Anthony Edwards, Philadelphia botched a 1st-and-goal situation at the Saints' 8 and had to settle for a FG. Just before halftime, Cunningham was sacked in the end zone for a safety to put the Saints up 16-10. After intermission, Cunningham hit TE Dave Little for a 1-yard TD and a 17-16 lead. On their next possession, the Birds again had 1st-n-goal, but earned only a FG. The Saints then rallied for two unanswered 4th qtr. TDs and the victory.

With a win needed to guarantee a second consecutive trip to the playoffs, the Eagles overcame the bitter cold and defeated the visiting Phoenix Cardinals 31-14 at Veterans Stadium. The Cards took an early 7-0 lead on a TD pass from Gary Hogeboom to Roy Green after Randall Cunningham had thrown an interception deep in Phoenix territory on the Birds' first drive. The Eagles, however, recovered to score 3 TDs and lead 21-7 with less than a minute remaining in the half. (One TD came when the Eagles, facing a 39-yard FG attempt, tried a fake FG . . . but, when the snap was too low for holder Matt Cavanaugh, K Roger Ruzek picked up the ball and completed a 22-yard TD pass to WR Cris Carter). Right before the half, however, the Cards put together a 65-yard TD drive. After intermission, the Eagles' "D" began to dominate and prevented the Cards from moving the ball consistently while their own offense did just that. Philadelphia finished with a season-high 267 yards on the ground. Heath Sherman had a season-longest 37-yard run and Anthony Toney led the team with a season-high 82 yards rushing. The defense helped seal the victory in the 4th qtr. as Byron Evans and Eric Everett made end zone INTs. The win propelled the Eagles into the Wild Card playoff game.

In the first NFL playoff game played at Veterans Stadium since December, 1981, QB Jim Everett threw two first quarter touchdown passes and the Los Angeles Rams went on to a 21-7 victory. After the Rams took a 14-0 lead on their first two drives, Philadelphia's defense settled in and—despite LA's frequent good field position—sufficiently shut down the visitors, allowing the Eagles to stay within reach. The Birds' offense, however, was unable to mount a solid drive and made only three first downs in the 1st half. Philadelphia had

a scoring opportunity, however, as Izel Jenkins intercepted an Everett pass and returned it to midfield with 2:00 remaining in the half; but Philadelphia was forced to punt for the 6th time in the half. After intermission, the Eagles moved into Ram territory on their first three possessions with the second resulting in a missed 48-yard FG, and the third in a one-yard TD run by Anthony Toney that cut the Rams' advantage to 14-7. Seth Joyner's INT on the Rams' next series gave the Eagles a chance to tie the score, but the offense again sputtered. Any chances of an Eagles' comeback were dashed when Greg Bell scampered 54 yards and then scored on a 7-yard run two plays later to give Los Angeles a 21-7 lead with 2:46 remaining.

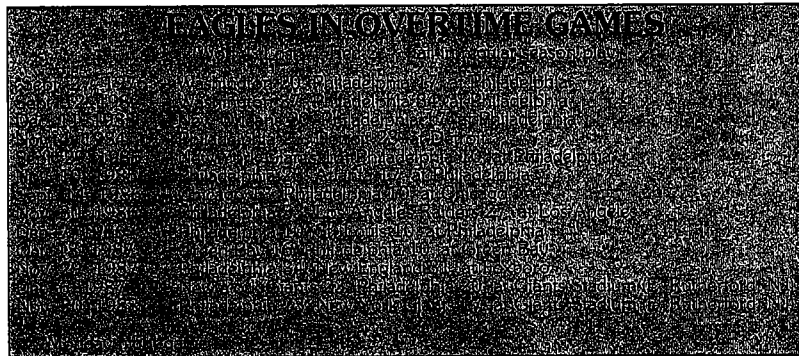
