Doug Pederson was named head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles on January 18, 2016, following a three-year run as the offensive coordinator of the Kansas City Chiefs from 2013-15. In his first season with the Eagles, Pederson helped develop rookie quarterback Carson Wentz, the No. 2-overall pick in the 2016 NFL Draft, and prepared the first-year signal caller to start the regular-season opener vs. the Cleveland Browns. Prior to arriving in Philadelphia, Pederson helped guide the Chiefs to a 31-17 regular-season record, which included a 10-0 stretch to close out the 2015 season. Pederson, who played quarterback for 12 seasons in the NFL, originally began his pro coaching career in Philadelphia, where he served under Andy Reid as the quarterbacks coach (2011-12) and as an offensive quality control coach (2009-10).

PHILADELPHIA EAGLES - HEAD COACH

- In his first season as Eagles head coach, Pederson tutored QB Carson Wentz, the second-overall pick in the 2016 draft, and named him the team's starting quarterback just eight days prior to the 2016 regular-season opener vs. the Cleveland Browns. Wentz went on to set a team and all-time NFL rookie record with 379 completions, while posting franchise rookie records in pass attempts (607), passing yards (3,782), passing touchdowns (16) and completion percentage (62.4%). Wentz also produced the 4th-most passing yards (3,782) in single-season team history and NFL rookie history. Wentz started all 16 games in his rookie season, becoming the first Eagles quarterback to start all 16 regular-season games since Donovan McNabb in 2008

KANSAS CITY - OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

- In his three seasons as Chiefs offensive coordinator, Pederson guided the team to a 31-17 regular-season record and playoff appearances in 2013 and 2015
- During Pederson's time in Kansas City, the Chiefs offense ranked first in the NFL in rushing touchdowns (54), third in yards per carry (4.64) and seventh in total rushing yards (6,018)
- Under Pederson's direction, the Chiefs excelled at protecting the football and committed the third-fewest turnovers (50) in the NFL since 2013. Over that span, Kansas City's +29 turnover differential ranked third in the league behind only Seattle (+37) and Carolina (+34), while the Chiefs were the only team to boast two seasons with at least a +12 differential (+18 in 2013 and +14 in 2015)
- In 2015, Pederson helped the Chiefs rebound from a 1-5 start to win a franchise-record 11-consecutive games, including Kansas City's first playoff victory in 22 years

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K.C. CHIEFS - OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR (Cont.)

- During Kansas City's 2015 regular-season winning streak, which began in Week 7, the Chiefs ranked tied for first in the NFL in rushing touchdowns (14), fourth in rushing yards per game (143.8) and tied for fifth in points per game (27.8). Limited turnovers helped propel Kansas City's run, as the Chiefs committed just seven total turnovers (four INTs, three fumbles) after Week 6 and finished the 2015 regular season with the second-fewest turnovers in the league (15)
- Kansas City's offense showed quick-strike ability in 2015, as the Chiefs ranked third in scoring drives of four plays or less (11 TDs for 75 points)
- The Chiefs acquired QB Alex Smith via trade in 2013 and the 10-year veteran experienced the most productive stretch of his career under Pederson's tutelage, a three-year span during which he set a Chiefs record for wins by a starting quarterback in his first three years as a starter (30)
- During his three years in Pederson's offense, Smith notched three-consecutive 3,000-yard seasons, threw the second-fewest interceptions among quarterbacks with at least 1,000 attempts (20) and ranked fourth among all quarterbacks with 1,183 rushing yards. Smith's 20 interceptions from 2013-15 marked the lowest three-season total of his career in years that he played more than 10 games
- In 2015, Smith threw for a career-high 3,486 yards, notched the second-most touchdown passes of his career (20) and recorded the highest QB rating of his career in a season with more than 300 attempts (95.4). Smith also added a career-high 498 rushing yards and two rushing TDs, marking the fourth-highest rushing-yardage total by a quarterback in the league
- Smith put together a streak of 312 passing attempts without an interception in 2015, marking the longest streak by any quarterback in the league that season and the second-longest streak by any quarterback in NFL history. The only quarterback to ever notch a better streak is Tom Brady, who went 358 passes without throwing an interception in a span between 2010-11
- In Smith's first season in Pederson's system (2013), the former No.1-overall pick set single-season career highs in passing yards (3,313) and passing touchdowns (23), while earning his first trip to the Pro Bowl
- During Pederson's first two seasons orchestrating the Chiefs offense (2013-14), Pro Bowl RB Jamaal Charles ranked third in the NFL in yards per carry (4.99), third in rushing touchdowns (21), fifth in rushing yards per game (77.3) and sixth in total rushing yards (2,320). In 2013, Charles' first season in Pederson's offense, the veteran back set career highs in yards from scrimmage (1,980), total touchdowns (19), receptions (70) and receiving yards (693). His 693 receiving yards were the most in the NFL by a running back that season
- In 2015, Charles was lost for the year following a knee injury sustained in Week 5. In Charles' absence, second-year backs Spencer Ware and Charcandrick West filled the void by combining for 227 carries, 1,020 rushing yards and 10 rushing TDs. Ware, who entered 2015 with just three career rushing attempts, logged career highs with 72 carries, 403 yards and six rushing TDs. West did not receive a carry in his 2014 rookie campaign, yet shouldered the rushing load in 2015 by carrying 160 times for 634 yards and four TDs, while catching 20 passes for 214 yards and a score
- After missing all but two games as a rookie in 2013 due to injury, Chiefs TE Travis Kelce (brother of Eagles C Jason Kelce) compiled 139 catches for 1,737 yards and 10 TDs from 2014-15,

marking the fourth-most receiving yards by a tight end during that span. Additionally, his 1,045 YAC were the most among NFL TEs from 2014-15. Kelce earned his first Pro Bowl berth in 2015

PHILADELPHIA EAGLES - QUARTERBACKS

- In 2011, his first season as the Eagles quarterbacks coach, Pederson helped QB Michael Vick become the second quarterback in NFL history to top the 3,000-yard passing and 500-yard rushing plateaus in consecutive seasons. That year, under Pederson's direction, Vick set career highs in completions (253) and passing yards (3,303) while throwing the third-most touchdowns of his career (18). Vick's yards through the air, combined with his 589 rushing yards, helped the Eagles offense record a then-franchise-record 6,386 net yards (now the second-highest total) and notch a team-record 356 first downs. Additionally, the 2011 Eagles offense ranked second in the league in plays of 10-plus yards (258) and tied for second in plays of 20-plus yards (84)
- During his two seasons working with Pederson, Vick recorded two of his top-three single-game passing performances in terms of yardage, notching 416 yards vs. SF (10/2/11) and 371 yards vs. Bal. (9/16/12)
- With the help of Pederson, Vick recorded four 300-yard passing performances during the 2012 campaign, marking the most 300-yard games that the 15-year veteran has recorded in a single season

PHILADELPHIA EAGLES - OFFENSIVE QC

- Pederson began his pro coaching career as an offensive quality control coach with the Eagles in 2009 and served in that capacity through the 2010 season. In his two seasons in that role, the Eagles combined for 868 points and set single-season franchise scoring records in back-to-back years (429 in 2009 and 439 in 2010). The 2010 and 2009 scoring outputs currently rank third and fourth, respectively, in franchise history

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PHILADELPHIA EAGLES - OFFENSIVE QC - Cont.

- In 2010, Pederson assisted an Eagles offense that recorded a then-franchise-record 6,230 net yards (now fourth), which ranked second in the NFL that season, and a then-franchise-record 439 points, which ranked third in the league. The 2010 Eagles had a propensity for big plays and ranked near the top of the league in plays of 20-plus yards (tied for first, 80), quick-striker touchdown drives (tied for first, 11) and scoring outside of the red zone (second, 139 points)
- During Pederson's first season with the Birds (2009), Philadelphia's offense threw for the fifth-most passing yards in Eagles annals (4,089), which at the time ranked second in franchise history

PEDERSON'S NFL PLAYING CAREER

- A 12-year NFL veteran, Pederson played quarterback for the Green Bay Packers, Miami Dolphins, Philadelphia Eagles and Cleveland Browns
- During his time in the league, Pederson was coached by three of the most successful coaches in NFL history: Don Shula, Mike Holmgren and Andy Reid. Additionally, Pederson played alongside Pro Bowl quarterbacks Brett Favre, Dan Marino, Donovan McNabb and Jim McMahon
- Pederson served as a backup quarterback for Green Bay from 1995-98 and 2001-04, and was a part of Packer teams that won Super Bowl XXXI, two NFC Championships (1996 and 1997) and six division titles
- Pederson made eight starts for the Browns in 2000 and logged 1,047 yards and two touchdowns on 117 completions
- In 1999, Pederson made nine starts for the Eagles, completing 119 passes for 1,276 yards and seven touchdowns
- Pederson was pressed into duty in a 1993 contest against the Eagles when Dolphins starter Scott Mitchell left the game with a shoulder injury. In the second half, he helped guide Miami to a 19-14 win that marked Don Shula's 325th career victory

COLLEGE PLAYING CAREER

- Attended Northeast Louisiana (now Louisiana Monroe) where he earned four letters and was a three-year starter at quarterback
- Finished his college career with 6,445 yards and 33 touchdowns on 571-of-1,032 passing
- Led the Southland Conference in passing as a senior when he completed 205 of 367 passes for 2,282 yards and 10 TDs
- Set a school record with 619 passing yards against Stephen F. Austin in 1989

"What I saw was a really important period of time when a transition was made from Doug to Donovan [McNabb]...I don't think there are very many people who can handle that transition like Doug in a good, positive, team-building way like he did. He absolutely understood his role. He was humble about it. He embraced it...He went through the process. He kept learning. He kept growing. His temperament is unflappable and that is so important as a coach who is going to be dealing with wins, losses, player preparation, player problems, media fiascos...He's going to be very consistent in good times and bad, and he's going to bring a culture into the Eagles organization that Jeffrey [Lurie] is in high favor of and totally supporting."

- Was an all-league selection at quarterback, safety and kicker at Ferndale and finished his high school career with 1,880 yards and 19 TDs on 106-of-250 passing
