T.J. McCreight was hired by the Eagles as a player personnel executive in the 2017 offseason and comes to Philadelphia after spending the previous five seasons (2012-16) as the director of college scouting with the Indianapolis Colts.

Prior to joining the Colts front office, McCreight worked as the director of pro personnel for the Arizona Cardinals from 2009-11.

McCreight began his NFL career in 1997 as an east coast area scout with the Baltimore Ravens and went on to work for the organization for eight seasons. In his final two years with the club (2003-04), he was promoted to national scout. During his time in Baltimore, McCreight worked alongside Eagles vice president of player personnel Joe Douglas, who, at the time, served as a player personnel assistant (2000-02) and a northeast area scout (2003-07) for the Ravens.

In 2005, McCreight left Baltimore to take a position as assistant director, player personnel with the Cleveland Browns. After just two seasons, he was promoted to director of player personnel.

A former tight end at Liberty University, McCreight began his post-playing career as a receivers coach at Oberlin College in 1993. Following the season, he was hired as the defensive line coach at Delaware State and coached there for four years.

McCreight graduated from Liberty University in 1992 with a bachelor's degree in marketing.

He and his wife, Linda, have one son, Matthew, and one daughter, Maggie.
