Anthony Patch enters his second stint and 16th overall season with the Eagles after being named senior director of college scouting on May 11, 2016. Patch rejoined the team under a consultant agreement on the personnel staff from January 2016 through the NFL Draft before being named to his current post. With Philadelphia, Patch previously held the titles of director of college scouting (2012-14) and assistant director of college scouting (2010-11) after serving as a college scout concentrating in the West Coast region.

Patch works closely with the scouting staff in draft preparation as well as scouting top players across the entire country.

Patch first served as the college scouting coordinator after joining the Eagles in 2002. In that role, Patch served as the liaison between the area scouts and the office. He helped coordinate college all-star games, the NFL Combine and assisted in prepa-

ration for the draft. He also helped the pro scouting department in evaluating teams.

Prior to that, he served as an intern in the Miami Dolphins player personnel department. He also assisted the team's legal counsel with positional market analysis for contract research.

Patch was a four-year player at defensive line and linebacker at Carroll College (Helena, Montana), where he earned a degree in finance. He went on to earn a MBA from the University of Montana in 2001.

A product of Ronan (MT) HS, Patch (born 2/2/78) and his wife, Rikki, have three daughters, Samantha, Addison and Breann.
