

MIKE BARTRUM

ASSISTANT TIGHT ENDS

1ST YEAR IN NFL · 1ST IN PHILADELPHIA COLLEGE: MARSHALL



Mike Bartrum, who played as a tight end and long snapper with Philadelphia from 2000-2006, was named the Eagles assistant tight ends coach during the 2019 offseason. Most recently, Bartrum served as the head football coach at Meigs High School in Pomeroy, OH.

Bartrum signed with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1993 as an undrafted free agent out of Marshall University and went on to play 13 seasons in the NFL, including the final seven as an Eagle. Predominantly a long snapper during his NFL career, Bartrum appeared in 188 career games (including playoffs) and added 11 catches for 65 yards and six touchdowns. During his career, Bartrum was a part of 10 playoff teams, appeared in five conference championship games and played in two Super Bowls. He also earned NFC Pro Bowl honors following the 2005 season.

Bartrum originally signed with the Eagles as a free agent in 2000 and went on to play in four consecutive NFC Championship Games and Super Bowl XXXIX during his first five seasons in Philadelphia. During that stretch, Bartrum snapped for Eagles Hall of Fame kicker David Akers.

After retiring from the NFL in 2007, Bartrum returned to his hometown of Pomeroy, OH, where he started a post-playing career as a Meigs County commissioner. In addition to working as a county commissioner, Bartrum was named the head football coach at Meigs High School in 2012.

A two-year starter and three-year letterman at Marshall, Bartrum totaled 109 career receptions for 1,187 yards and 10 TDs. He earned consensus All-Southern Conference honors as a senior when he caught 62 passes for 680 yards and nine touchdowns, guiding Marshall to a Division I-AA national title.

Bartrum and his wife, Jennifer, have four children: Cody, Zach, Ty, and Taylor.
