

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- In 2019, was named first team All-Pro by the Associated Press for the thirdconsecutive season and earned a Pro Bowl nod for the third time in his career (2015, 2017, 2020)
- In 2018, named first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press for a second straight season after allowing only 1.0 sack in 16 games started. He was integral in helping block for a unit that ranked 3rd in the NFL in offensive points per game (27.0) from Weeks 12-18, when the Eagles finished the season 5-1 en route to their second consecutive playoff berth
- Named first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press after playing an integral role on the Eagles' Super Bowl LII-winning offensive line. In 2017, helped the team rank 3rd in the NFL in offensive points (414, tied) and rushing offense (132.2) as well as 7th in total offense (365.8)
- In 2016, earned his second Pro Bowl nod in three seasons after seeing action in all 1,133 of the Eagles' offensive snaps
- Voted to the Pro Bowl for the first time in 2014, becoming the first Eagles center to gain such recognition since Jim Ringo was named to his 10th Pro Bowl following the 1967 campaign



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HUNGRY DOGS RUN FASTER

Dressed in Mummers regalia at the podium atop the steps of the Philadelphia Museum of Art, Kelce closed the Eagles' Parade of Champions with an emotional, powerful and memorable speech that solidified his unique place in Philadelphia folklore. Inspired by the "underdog" theme associated with the Eagles' playoff run, Kelce delivered an ode to his teammates and the resilient spirit of the city of Philadelphia.

"It was a very real moment for myself and I think that the fans and really everybody watching it picked up on that as well, that it was really coming from the heart. It wasn't some sort of show, even though it might have looked like it with the Mummer outfit and all the spectacle around it. It was something that came from a burning place down inside that had been engrained through a lot of hard work, a lot of failures, a lot of success throughout my entire career, and the same thing with the city and this entire organization."

FOOTBALL IS FAMILY

Kelce comes from a football lineage, as his younger brother, Travis, was a teammate at Cincinnati (2008-10) as a tight end and was drafted by Kansas City in 2013.

His uncle, Don Blalock, played defensive tackle for Purdue (1976-77) and his grandfather, Don Blalock, played football at Ohio University.

BIRDSEED

Kelce is the son of Donna and Ed Kelce. Donna works in banking, while Ed is a sales rep in the steel business. He cites his dad as the biggest influence on his career.

Kelce and his wife, Kylie, have two dogs, Winnie and Baloo. Kelce graduated from Cincinnati with a bachelor's degree in marketing.

- In 2013, helped the Eagles set a team record with 6,676 total yards and a then-team record 442 points
- Became the first Eagles rookie offensive lineman to start all 16 games since **Doug Brzezineski** did so in 1999 and the first rookie in team history to start every game at center
