



# RICH SCANGARELLO

SENIOR OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

NFL Experience: 6th season (1st with Eagles)

College: Sacramento State Hometown: Roseville, CA

Rich Scangarello joined the Eagles as a senior offensive assistant during the 2020 offseason and brings 23 combined years of NFL and collegiate experience to Philadelphia's coaching staff.

Prior to joining the Eagles, Scangarello spent the 2019 season as the Denver Broncos' offensive coordinator and helped mentor a young offensive core. Among the rookies, QB **Drew Lock** finished his season 4-1 to match John Elway for the most wins by a rookie quarterback in team history. Lock became just the seventh rookie quarterback in the NFL to win at least four of his first five starts. Additionally, TE **Noah Fant** posted the most receptions (40) and receiving yards (562) by a rookie tight end in Broncos history. Among Denver's second-year players, **Phillip Lindsay** rushed for 1,011 yards in 2019, making him the first undrafted player in NFL history to top the 1,000-yard mark in consecutive seasons to start his career. **Courtland Sutton** also tied for second in the league with 16 receptions of 25-plus yards.

During his two seasons (2017-18) as the quarterbacks coach for the San Francisco 49ers, Scangarello worked with four different signal callers in **Jimmy Garoppolo**, **C.J. Beathard**, **Brian Hoyer** and **Nick Mullens**, who started at least six games each in that span. Despite being the only NFL team with at least three different quarterbacks starting six-or-more games from 2017-18, the 49ers ranked 10th in the NFL in passing yards per game (265.1) and 20-plus-yard passes (110).

Garoppolo, who suffered a season-ending injury in Week 3 of the 2018 season, started eight of nine games played for the 49ers after being acquired from New England in a midseason trade in 2017. He completed 173-of-267 passes (64.8%) for 2,278 yards with 12 touchdowns, eight interceptions and a 94.1 passer rating while leading the team to a 6-2 record during that span. Following injuries to both Garoppolo and Beathard, Mullens – an undrafted rookie – was promoted to the active roster and started all eight games he appeared in, accumulating the fourth-most passing yards by a quarterback in their first eight career games since 1970. In his debut versus the Oakland Raiders on Nov. 1, 2018, Mullens threw for 262 yards and recorded the second-best quarterback rating (151.9) by a passer in their NFL debut since 1973.

Before joining the 49ers, Scangarello spent the 2016 season as the offensive coordinator at Wagner College. The Seahawks finished 6-5 as the offense ranked second in the Northeast Conference in scoring (29.7 ppg), passing (257.8 ypg) and giveaways (7).

Scangarello worked the 2015 season as an offensive quality control coach with the Falcons working under offensive coordinator, **Kyle Shanahan** and head coach **Dan Quinn**. In Atlanta, he assisted the offensive line with run-game preparation and coordinated the defensive scout team for the offense.

Before his one season with the Falcons, Scangarello spent three years (2012-14) as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Northern Arizona, helping the Lumberjacks to a 24-11 record and an FCS postseason berth in 2013. In 2012, quarterback **Gary Grossart** completed a school-record 66.7 percent of his passes as the offense ranked 27th in the NCAA in points per game (31.6).

Prior to his time at NAU, Scangarello spent the 2010-11 seasons as the offensive coordinator, assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach at Millsaps in Jacksonville, Mississippi.

Scangarello entered the NFL in 2009 with the Oakland Raiders as an offensive quality control coach following four years (2005-08) at UC-Davis, which included one year (2008) as the school's co-offensive coordinator. The Aggies' offense ranked 11th in FCS in total offense (426.5 ypg) while scoring 28.5 points per game during his lone season as offensive coordinator.

Scangarello worked at Idaho as an offensive graduate assistant in 2000 before spending the 2002-03 seasons as the school's quarterbacks coach. In 2001, he was the offensive coordinator at Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota.

He started his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at UC-Davis (1998-99), working with consecutive consensus Division II All-Americans, quarterbacks **Kevin Daft** and **J.T. O'Sullivan**, who were both drafted in the NFL.

A native of Roseville, California, Scangarello began coaching in 1996 at his alma mater, Oakmont High School, after earning a degree in business administration from Sacramento State University.
