



# MARTY MORNHINWEG

## SENIOR OFFENSIVE CONSULTANT



NFL Experience: 25th season (11th with Eagles)

Marty Mornhinweg was named senior offensive consultant for the Eagles during the 2020 offseason, where he previously spent 10 seasons as a senior assistant and offensive coordinator/assistant head coach. A 36-year coaching veteran, Mornhinweg brings extensive experience at every level from quality control through head coaching.

Prior to joining the Eagles, Mornhinweg most recently served as the Ravens offensive coordinator from 2016-18. In his final season with the team, Mornhinweg helped transition the offense from veteran QB Joe Flacco to rookie Lamar Jackson midseason. The first-round pick went 6-1 as a starter as the Ravens rallied to win the AFC North. Despite the change, Baltimore finished ninth in yards gained. In 2017, the Ravens finished the season ranked ninth overall in points per game (24.7).

Mornhinweg originally joined the Ravens as a quarterbacks coach in 2015 and was a part of an offensive staff that started four different quarterbacks (Flacco, Matt Schaub, Jimmy Clausen and Ryan Mallett) for the first time in franchise history. Yet, he helped Baltimore set a franchise-record 4,271 net passing yards (266.9 ypg) and the second-most total net yards in team history (5,749). Flacco tallied a career-high and franchise-best 4,317 passing yards in 2016.

Mornhinweg spent two seasons as offensive coordinator for the New York Jets, who ranked third in rushing offense (138.7ypg) during that span. In 2014, he helped guide a rushing attack that finished third in the NFL with 142.5 yards per game behind RBs Chris Ivory and Chris Johnson. In addition, C Nick Mangold earned Pro Bowl honors for the fifth time in six seasons. In 2013, QB Geno Smith became the first rookie signal caller to start all 16 games in franchise history and New York's rushing attack finished sixth in the NFL with 134.9 yards per game.

During his first tenure in Philadelphia (2003-12), Mornhinweg was a key component of six top-10 scoring offenses, two of the top five scoring offenses in team history, and three of the top five Eagles offenses in terms of yards gained. From 2008-11, the Eagles ranked in the top eight in scoring each of those four seasons. 10 different offensive players earned a total of 17 Pro Bowl honors while Mornhinweg was a part of the offensive staff, including quarterbacks Michael Vick and Donovan McNabb. Mornhinweg's first stint with the Eagles included an appearance in Super Bowl XXXIX during his first season guiding the offense, two NFC Championship Games, four division titles, and six playoffs. Mornhinweg was named Pro Football Weekly NFL Assistant Coach of the Year in 2010 after Philadelphia set a then-franchise record in total points (439).

Mornhinweg spent two seasons (2001-02) with the Detroit Lions in his first NFL head-coaching role.

Serving as the 49ers offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for four seasons, the offense ranked third in total net yards (364.4 ypg) including third in rushing (131.4 ypg) and fifth in passing (233.2 ypg) from 1997-2000. In his last season with the 49ers, he helped WR Terrell Owens finish fourth in the NFL in receiving yards (1,451) and third in TDs (13). In addition, QB Jeff Garcia finished second in passing yards (4,278) and third in TDs (31). Under Mornhinweg, the 49ers boasted the NFL's No. 1 rushing offense (130.9 ypg) in 1999. In 1998, San Francisco's offense was No. 1 in the NFL (425.0 ypg), including first in rushing (159.0 ypg) and second in passing (266.0 ypg). Mornhinweg's unit became just the third in NFL history to lead the league in both rushing yards and gross passing yards in the same season (San Francisco, 1939, and Chicago, 1941). In 1997, he helped lead the 49ers to the NFC title game.

Mornhinweg began his NFL coaching career as an offensive assistant with the Packers in 1995. Mornhinweg was promoted to quarterbacks coach in 1996. In that year, he helped lead Brett Favre to NFL MVP honors after throwing a league-high and career-best 39 TDs and the Packers to a victory in Super Bowl XXXI.

Prior to his time coaching in the NFL, Mornhinweg got his collegiate coaching career started in 1985 at his alma mater, Montana, as the wide receivers coach. He went on to spend two seasons (1986-87) as a graduate assistant with Texas at El Paso. He took a year-long break from coaching to play one season as quarterback in the Arena Football League with the Denver Dynamite. Mornhinweg spent one season with Northern Arizona as the team's running backs coach in 1988, before earning his first role as a coordinator with Southeast Missouri State, where he spent two seasons (1989-90) as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach. He moved on to serve on the coaching staff at Missouri for three seasons (1991-93), first as tight ends/slots coach and then as offensive line coach. He then returned to Northern Arizona in 1994 where he spent one season as offensive coordinator.

Mornhinweg attended the University of Montana, where he was a four-year starting quarterback. He set 15 passing records for the Grizzlies and was elected to the Hall of Fame for the university. He graduated from Montana with a degree in health and physical education in 1985 and earned his master's degree in health and physical education/sports administration from UTEP in 1988.

A native of Edmond, Oklahoma, Mornhinweg attended Oak Grove High School where he played for coach Mike Holmgren, earning Northern California High School Player of the Year honors as a senior quarterback. He is married to Lindsay and the couple has four children: two sons, Skyler and Bobby, and two daughters, Madison and Molly.
